WHAT IS A LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE?

Licensed Practical Nurses are vital members of any healthcare team. In many cases, LPNs are one of the patient's first contacts in a medical facility. The job duties of Licensed Practical Nurses are typically patientfocused, including managing basic patient care.

Practical Nursing could be a great career option for those looking to work in a career that can directly and positively impact the patient's experience in a healthcare facility. LPNs work closely with Registered Nurses to provide routine care to sick and injured patients. Practical Nurses implement care plans that are essential to patient care and comfort.

According to the <u>Bureau of Labor Statistics</u>, there are approximately 6,190 Licensed Practical Nurses working in West Virginia as of May 2021.



NURSING SHORTAGE IN WEST VIRGINIA

The need for nurses across the United States is at an alltime high, according to <u>The American Nurses Association</u>. The lasting effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have intensified the need for new nurses. Many factors have contributed to the shortage of nurses across America, including the aging population of patients and current nurses. As the Baby Boomer Generation ages, the need for patient care is expected to grow.

Another impact on the workforce as a result of the pandemic is burnout in nursing. As frontline workers, many nurses experience prolonged periods of stress, which can lead to a high turnover rate in some situations. A study by <u>McKinsey & Company</u> showed that up to 22% of nurses have considered leaving the nursing profession due to burnout.



NURSING SHORTAGE IN WEST VIRGINIA

The effects of the nationwide nursing shortage have been impacting the state of West Virginia for some time. In a study conducted by the <u>West Virginia Center for Nursing</u>, by 2026, the demand for qualified nurses was and will continue to be high in 32 West Virginia counties. The remaining 18 counties have a moderate demand level, making the need for nurses a statewide issue.

HOW WVJC CAN HELP

By offering those interested in starting a practical nursing career the option to obtain a Diploma in Practical Nursing in just 12 months, WVJC allows future nurses to learn the skills and knowledge needed to start their careers and enter the workforce quickly. As part of the curriculum in the Practical Nursing program, students will partake in clinical experiences that help them establish relationships with local hospitals in preparation for entering the workforce.



FIRST STEPS TO BECOMING A PRACTICAL NURSE

Once deciding to pursue a career in nursing as a Practical Nurse, prospective students begin researching schools that offer programs that fulfill education requirements for licensing in West Virginia. Licensed Practical Nurses must complete an approved program that is 12 months in length and it is recommended that the program should provide preparation for the NCLEX-PN* exam.

Before beginning practical nursing school, students must also obtain a high school diploma or GED.

An admissions team member at WVJC Bridgeport will outline the application process in detail. One of the first steps is to take the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) exam.



TEST OF ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC SKILLS (TEAS)

The Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) exam is designed by <u>Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI)</u> to evaluate a student's preparedness to enter a health science field.

The TEAS test consists of material from the following subjects: Reading, Mathematics, Science, and English and Language Usage. Students are given three hours and twenty-nine minutes to complete a series of 170 multiplechoice, multiple-select, fill-in-the-blank, ordered responses, or hot spot questions.

Prospective students planning to take the TEAS exam for entrance to the Practical Nursing Diploma program at WVJC have access to a variety of materials to help them study, including online preparation groups and online practice videos. ATI recommends that students prepare for the exam for at least six weeks before taking it, so beginning the process early can help you be successful.



NCLEX-PN EXAM

The <u>National Council Licensure Examination for Practical</u> <u>Nursing</u> (NCLEX-PN)* exam is the industry-passing standard test that reflects a nurse's ability to work as a practical nurse in the field safely and competently. As nursing practices change, the <u>NCSBN</u> Board of Directors reviews the exam every three years and makes necessary changes to ensure the standards are up to date.

The WVJC Practical Nursing program includes important preparation for the NCLEX-PN exam, but students also have access to <u>online study methods</u>.

The NCLEX exam is a high-level exam that requires critical thinking and decision-making skills to analyze and answer situation-based questions. The test is divided into four sections based on client needs: Safe and Effective Care Environment, Health Promotion And Maintenance, Psychosocial Integrity, and Physiological Integrity.



NCLEX-PN EXAM

The NCLEX exam operates using <u>computerized adaptive</u> <u>testing (CAT)</u> to administer the exam. By using this system, the computer can evaluate the testee by their ability to answer the questions accurately. This allows each exam to be individualized to determine true ability.

The test is graded on a pass-or-fail system determined by one of the following three rules. Learn more about how these rules operate by clicking each box.








HEALTHCARE POSITIONS IN WEST VIRGINIA

Many healthcare careers are available with varying education levels and time commitments. Below are the educational requirements and time

investments for common positions in West Virginia.





PATHWAY OPTIONS

Medical Assisting to Practical Nursing Pathway

WVJC offers our medical assistant graduates the option to move into the Practical Nursing program by utilizing our pathway option. This option works as a stepping stone, allowing students to complete our medical assistant training, then move on to the LPN* training program. This is an excellent option for someone who has yet to gain experience in the healthcare field, so they are better prepared for the rigorous nursing classes.





PATHWAY OPTIONS

Medical Assisting to Practical Nursing Pathway

Students who partake in the pathway program also benefit from having the TEAS exam requirement waived, allowing them to move directly into the Practical Nursing program. This can be helpful for students who struggle with standardized testing, allowing them to use handson skills learned in their medical assistant training program to prove their ability to continue to nursing school.

Practical Nursing to Registered Nursing Pathway

Practical Nurses who attended WVJC can later complete the LPN° to RN~ Pathway Program if they decide to further their education within five years of graduation from the Practical Nursing program. WVJC graduates who pursue this option can enter the Nursing program without taking the TEAS exam and having their seat fee to the program waived.

°Passing the NCLEX-PN exam is required to become a Practical Nurse. ~Passing the NCLEX-RN exam is required to become a Registered Nurse.



THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AN LPN AND RN

One of the most notable differences between becoming a Licensed Practical Nurse and a Registered Nurse is the time investment in education. WVJC's Diploma in Practical Nursing can be completed in 12 months, while other nursing programs can take up to four years to complete coursework at traditional institutions. WVJC's Nursing program can take 18 to 19 months, depending on the start date.



- 12-month diploma program
- Must pass the NCLEX-PN° exam
- Works directly with patients providing basic care
- Works closely on teams with doctors and Registered Nurses



Registered Nurse

- 18-19 month* program at WVJC
- Up to four-five years at traditional institutions
- Must pass the NCLEX-RN~ exam
- Coordinates patient care, medication, educates healthcare team, and more

WHERE CAN A LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE WORK?

The skills LPNs learn in their education make them valuable team members in many medical facilities, including long-term care nursing home facilities, in-home agencies, pediatrician offices, hospitals or emergency rooms, private physicians, and more.





BENEFITS OF OUR PROGRAM

Direct Admission

WVJC employs a <u>direct admission</u> policy, meaning students will save time and money by not taking unnecessary classes or taking classes to find out later they are not accepted into the nursing program.

Hands-On Training and Clinical Experiences

West Virginia Junior College students have the opportunity to learn fundamental skills during lectures, then apply hands-on skills during clinical rotations at local area medical facilities where they will work with actual patients in a real-world environment. At the end of the Practical Nursing program, students will be prepared to sit for the NCLEX-PN* licensure exam.

Accelerated Training

As a result of our direct admission program, students will complete their training in only twelve months. <u>Accelerated training</u> allows students to learn the necessary practical nursing skills, prepare to sit for the NCLEX-PN* exam, and enter the workforce quickly.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: What does a Practical Nurse do?

A: In many cases, Practical Nurses work directly with patients, but their skills include reviewing medical histories, collecting samples for lab testing, monitoring vitals, and more.

Q: What is the difference between an RN and LPN?

A: RNs have completed more education and therefore have a larger scope of work than LPNs, who focus on basic patient medical care. Because of their extended education, RNs take on managerial roles and generally can perform more complex procedures.

Q: How long does it take to become an LPN in West Virginia?

A: Students pursuing a Practical Nursing Diploma in West Virginia can expect to be prepared to sit for licensing exam in 12 months.

Q: Where can an LPN work?

A: Practical Nurses can work in a variety of medical settings, including pediatrician offices, hospitals, emergency rooms, nursing care facilities, home health agencies, or private physicians.
